# Art AIDS America: Sneak Peek in West Hollywood

**Tacoma, WA** – HIV/AIDS has touched nearly every American in some way, and has forever influenced American art. The City of West Hollywood's One City One Pride and ONE Archives Gallery & Museum present a select preview of the groundbreaking exhibition *Art AIDS America*, organized by Tacoma Art Museum (WA). The preview opens on June 6 with art on view through September 6.

You can be among the first to connect with this major exhibition and see 47 works in these two

neighboring venues. At West Hollywood Library, explore a wide range of creative expressions from the early years of AIDS to the present. Highlights include a 1985 portrait of Ken Meeks by Alon Reininger, printed in *Life Magazine,* and 2014 self-portraits created by Kia Labeija (who was born with HIV), as well as art by Brian Buczak, the collective fierce pussy, and others. ONE Gallery focuses on California artists, from recent work by Tino Rodriguez and Ann P. Meredith to1986 photographs by Catherine Opie that have never before been on view.

Since its discovery, AIDS has shaped art, politics, medicine, and pop culture. There have been other AIDS-related art exhibitions. *Art AIDS America* is the first that comprehensively considers the full range of artistic responses during 30 years of the epidemic in the United States, and identifies the resulting change on the direction of American art as whole. It introduces and explores the whole spectrum of artistic responses to AIDS, from the politically outspoken to the quietly mournful, surveying works from the early 1980s to the present.



Visitors will learn how HIV/AIDS became a force that shifted art from neutral, conceptual postmodernism towards a new, more politically insistent and autobiographical expression. The exhibition also shines a light on the continued growth of HIV among people of all orientations and in all walks of life.

Get a glimpse of this preview at West Hollywood Library and the adjacent ONE Gallery. The complete exhibition of more than 115 works debuts at Tacoma Art Museum on October 3, 2015, on view through January 10, 2016, before traveling to Zuckerman Museum of Art, Kennesaw State University, GA, and The Bronx Museum of the Arts, NY.

### About The City of West Hollywood's One City One Pride Festival

Each year, the City of West Hollywood celebrates LGBTQ Pride Month with the One City One Pride Arts Festival. For 2015, One City One Pride will run from Harvey Milk Day (May 22) through the end of June Pride Month (June 30). In celebration of West Hollywood's 30th anniversary of Cityhood, One City One Pride takes a look at what it means to turn 30 with the theme **'WeHo@30**, **Life@30'**. In addition, since the City was founded during the early years of the AIDS crisis, a major component of One City One Pride will be a look back at the impact AIDS has had on art and culture with 'WeHo@30: Art AIDS WeHo', which continues through September with extended exhibits and performances. One City One Pride was recently awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to support its programming in 2016, when the theme will be 'Into the Streets', referring to a rallying cry used during the early years of the LGBTQ rights movement. The collection includes the world's largest retrospective museum collection of glass art by Tacoma native Dale Chihuly on continued view; the world's largest collection of jewelry by Northwest artists; key holdings in 19th century European and 20th century American art; and one of the finest collections of Japanese woodblock prints on the West Coast.
