The Outwin 2016: American Portraiture Today

Through Sunday, May 14

From the Smithsonian's National Portrait Gallery comes a showcase of today's most commendable American portraits. See the 43 finalists from the triennial Outwin Boochever Portrait Competition at Tacoma Art Museum, the only West Coast location for this exhibition!

We live in a culture that is shaped by social media. We play with identity through technology, which both connects us and isolates us. It is no wonder the genre of portraiture is experiencing renewed significance and thriving in the contemporary art world. As a genre, portraiture is akin to the raw, direct nature of a journal entry, often revealing aspects of the sitter's identity that are messy or complicated, or even artfully concealing the truth. It is the most personal—and certainly the most psychological—of art forms.



Every three years, the Smithsonian's National Portrait Gallery invites artists to participate in the most prestigious portrait contest in the country: the juried Outwin Boochever Portrait Competition. In 2016, its fourth iteration, jurors selected 43 winning works from more than 2,500 entries. For the first time ever, the Portrait Gallery is sending the exhibition on tour. Tacoma Art Museum is honored to host *The Outwin 2016: American Portraiture Today*.

Students from across the state attend <u>this residential school</u> in Vancouver, Washington. The art on view showcases high school and middle school work. Often, people are surprised that blind people have any interest in producing visual art! Visitors to this exhibition will understand that this is a misperception; many students at this school see with their hands. Come and be surprised by the wonderful art these students have created mediums including clay, papier-mâché, paint, paper, wire, and glass. The artwork is not only meant to be viewed but also

explored through touch. TAM Local is in the Cheney Classroom on the top floor.

Coast to Cascades: C. C. McKim's Impressionist Vision

Through Sunday, March 26



C.C. McKim's artistic career as an impressionist painter flourished in Portland, Oregon, during the early 20th century. McKim's light-filled, evocative images of Oregon landscapes capture the unique beauty and character of the Northwest. As both an artist and a mentor, he was influential in popularizing impressionist painting in this region. The exhibition and accompanying catalogue present a survey of McKim's career and explore his impact on the Northwest art scene.

This exhibition is co-curated by Tacoma Art Museum's Curator of Collections and Special Exhibitions, Margaret Bullock, and art historian and gallerist Mark Humpal from Portland.

Fujita, Ginny Ruffner, Stanislav Libenský and Jaroslava Brychtová, Lino Tagliapietra, Cappy Thompson and Ulrica Hydman Vallien. With the gift of the Benaroya Collection, TAM will have one of the most important studio art glass collections in the United States.

This exhibition will offer a chronological walk through Northwest art history, illustrated with the works of well-known artists from each time period as well as lesser-known figures. Some sections in the exhibition will change regularly to offer in-depth looks at original voices and fresh stories. Visitors can encounter different works and ideas each time they visit during this long-running visual exploration of how Northwest art has evolved. Promoting the West: Abby Williams Hill and the Railroads

Saturday, June 3 through Sunday, October 15



From 1903 to 1906, Tacoma artist Abby Williams Hill (1861-1943) painted the Pacific Northwest landscape and Yellowstone National Park for the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads. She was the first woman artist (and one of only a few) hired by these railroad companies. Her images were used for promotional campaigns encouraging railroad travel to the West for tourism or settlement.

Both artist and adventurer, the intrepid Hill spent months at a time camping and painting in the wilderness with her four children, wrestling with weather, animals, and other challenges to create her works. She asked to be paid in train

tickets rather than cash so that she and her family could travel and she could pursue the social causes that she was passionate about.

Through a selection of paintings, sketches, and archival materials, come explore the impact that the railroad commissions had on Hill's work. Find out how her romanticized views of uninhabited wilderness helped the railroads to shape public opinions about the West and western expansion.

Zhi LIN: In Search of the Lost History of Chinese Migrants and the Transcontinental Railroads

Tuesday June 27, 2017 through Sunday, February 4, 2018



Internationally acclaimed artist Zhi LIN has refocused attention on the forgotten yet vital history of the Chinese laborers from an iconic moment in American history. Thousands of men migrated from China to seek fortunes in the gold mines of California but, instead, many found work building the transcontinental railroads. Celebrated as a technical marvel in its day, the transcontinental railroad was built and constructed in less than a decade, from 1860 to 1869, due largely to the contributions by Chinese who cut through the mountains and deserts of the American west. The absence of Chinese laborers from American

history books is an animating force in Lin's work.

Lin's paintings carry significant resonance in our region. Through his works, learn more about the legacy of contentious labor relations during the construction of the railroads, racism, and the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882.

See Gilbert Stuart's portrait and more in the latest rotation of works for this long-running exhibition drawn from the Haub Family Collection of Western American Art. From the Hudson River school to modernism, this exhibition examines artistic styles, trends, and movements that influenced the imagery and perceptions of the American west. See works by Albert Bierstadt, Thomas Moran and other painters and sculptors who connected the art of the West to larger movements in American and European art.

About Tacoma Art Museum

Celebrating 80 years, Tacoma Art Museum is an anchor in the city's downtown and a gathering space for connecting people through art. TAM's collection contains nearly 5,000 works, with an emphasis on the art and artists of the Northwest and broader western region. The collection includes the largest retrospective museum collection of glass art by Tacoma native Dale Chihuly on continuous view; the most significant museum collection of jewelry by Northwest artists; key holdings in 19th century European and 20th century American art; and one of the finest collections of Japanese woodblock prints on the West Coast. In 2014, TAM welcomed a gift of 295 works of western American art in the Haub Family Collection, one of the premier collections in the nation and the first major western American art museum collection in the Northwest. The Haub gift included \$20 million for new galleries and endowed funds. The Haub Family Galleries opened in 2014. In January 2016, TAM announced the gift of the Benaroya Collection, including 225 works of art. The donation also includes nearly \$14 million in funding for new gallery space to showcase the collection and an endowment for a dedicated curator and care for the collection. The Benaroya wing is expected to open in fall 2018.
